Why Christianity? Examining the Truth Through Scripture

The God of the Bible: Who He Is

Immutability (God Does Not Change):

God's nature is unchanging, as declared in Malachi 3:6: "For I the Lord do not change; therefore you, O children of Jacob, are not consumed." His immutability assures us that His promises, decrees, and purposes are steadfast. Psalm 102:27 affirms, "You are the same, and your years have no end." This aligns with the Westminster Confession of Faith, which teaches that God is "infinite, eternal, and unchangeable in His being, wisdom, power, holiness, justice, goodness, and truth" (WCF II.1).

Sovereignty (God's Absolute Rule):

Scripture proclaims God's sovereign authority over all creation: "Our God is in the heavens; He does all that He pleases" (Psalm 115:3). In Romans 9:21, Paul explains God's sovereign right to do as He wills with His creation, comparing Him to a potter who has power over the clay. This demonstrates God's control over history, salvation, and every detail of life, underscoring the truth of Ephesians 1:11: "He works all things according to the counsel of His will."

Holiness (God's Absolute Purity):

Isaiah 6:3 declares, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of His glory!" God's holiness is not merely an attribute but the very essence of His being. He is set apart from all that is sinful and impure. The Westminster Confession affirms that God is "most holy in all His counsels, in all His works, and in all His commands" (WCF II.2).

Love (God's Unmerited Grace):

The Scriptures reveal that "God is love" (1 John 4:8) and that He demonstrates this love through the sending of His Son: "But God shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). This love is not sentimental or conditional but rooted in His sovereign will to redeem a people for Himself (Ephesians 1:4-5).

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The Gospel: The Center of Christianity

The heart of Christianity is the gospel—the good news that God has provided salvation through His Son, Jesus Christ. This truth is founded on God's holiness, justice, and mercy.

1. God's Holiness and Our Sin:

All humanity has sinned and fallen short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23). The wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23), and apart from Christ, we are by nature children of wrath (Ephesians 2:3). God's holiness demands justice, and He cannot overlook sin (Habakkuk 1:13).

2. Christ's Substitutionary Atonement:

In His mercy, God sent His Son to bear the punishment for our sin. Isaiah 53:5 declares, "He was pierced for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities." Christ, who knew no sin, became sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God (2 Corinthians 5:21).

3. God's Sovereign Grace in Salvation:

Salvation is entirely the work of God's grace, not of human effort. Ephesians 2:8-9 reminds us, "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast." God, in His sovereignty, regenerates the heart and enables faith through the power of the Holy Spirit (Ezekiel 36:26, John 3:5).

4. The Assurance of God's Promises:

Those whom God has called and justified will persevere to the end, as Paul writes in Philippians 1:6: "He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." This eternal security is rooted in God's unchanging character and His covenant promises.

A Call to Examine and Respond

In light of these truths, Scripture calls us to examine ourselves and respond to the gospel:

- Repentance and Faith: Mark 1:15 exhorts, "Repent and believe in the gospel." True repentance involves turning from sin and submitting to God's lordship, while faith rests entirely on the finished work of Christ.
- **Self-Examination:** Paul commands, "Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith" (2 Corinthians 13:5). We must continually test our hearts and lives against the Word of God.

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• Living for God's Glory: The ultimate purpose of humanity, as stated in the Westminster Shorter Catechism, is to "glorify God and enjoy Him forever." This is achieved by walking in obedience to His Word and proclaiming His truth to the world.

Christianity is not merely a belief system; it is the revealed truth of God's eternal plan for His creation. May we commit ourselves to knowing this truth deeply, living it faithfully, and sharing it boldly for the glory of God alone.
