Romans 12:2

"Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is —His good, pleasing and perfect will."

In the 1980 introduction of the television series called **Cosmos** that was hosted by: *Carl Sagan.*

Sagan made the assertion that:

- 2. John 1:1-14 These verses describe Jesus as the Word (Logos) and state, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."
